We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.</p> <p>To join the full-time programme you must normally have A-level/B2 (CEFR) competence, or the equivalent, in Spanish, but a high AS/B1 level qualification may also be accepted. 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18	<p>Learning, teaching and assessment methods</p> <p>For Foundation Year (year zero), see Foundation Year programme specification.</p> <p>Literature and culture modules are taught in either English, Spanish or Portuguese. Language modules are taught in the target language.</p> <p>CULTURE MODULES</p> <p>SPLAS culture modules are assessed by a variety of formative and summative assignments, including elements of bibliographical research and oral and written presentations of complex arguments in different forms. Learning aims and outcomes of the cultural components of our</p>
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programme emphasize the development of critical and analytical skills in the study of Iberian, Latin American and Luso-phone cultures through a progressive understanding of fields of knowledge. Coursework is intended to facilitate students' learning by providing them with opportunities for professional applications as well as module-specific expertise. The combination of forms of assessment is designed to reflect student progression in research, critical expression, and knowledge-related aspects of competence relevant to the degree from Level 4 to Level 6. These various forms of coursework assignments (annotated bibliographies, critical reviews, essays of variable length and purpose -from summative to research aims-, individual and group presentations, portfolios) are also means by which students are given structured feedback throughout the year. Clear criteria are given to students early on in each of the modules. They therefore know what to expect and what aspects of their work will be evaluated.

At level 4, content modules are examined by a combination of summative and formative assessments reflecting both the course content and methodological and research skills acquired during the study skills sessions that are part of the module and relevant to the entire programme:

1 group presentation + short individual portfolio (up to 1,000 words): 20%

1 theme-specific annotated bibliography (up to 1,200 words): 40%

A book/article review (up to 2,000 words): 40%

At level 5, students progress to the introductory stages of self-guided, independent research:

1 group or individual presentation (depending on number of students) + short individual log (up to 1,500 words): 30%

1 critical review of book/article (up to 1,500 words): 30%

1 essay (2,500 words): 40%

At level 6, the aim is to assess the ongoing progress to complex, self-guided and independent research under the supervision of the module tutor:

Essay 1 (2,500 words): 40%

Essay 2 (3,500 words): 60%

LANGUAGE MODULES

Our language provision, mapped to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), comprises five stages that go from complete beginners to proficiency level (degree level). The courses are designed to help students develop key skills in the target language (listening, speaking, reading and writing) appropriate to each level. Additional skills introduced from stage 1 include independent learning skills, intercultural skills and IT, while translation is taught at higher levels. Students are also gradually introduced to different varieties of Spanish and to the cultural diversity of the countries where the language studied is spoken.

There are specific learning outcomes for each language stage in terms of the different skills and knowledge the courses aim to develop; these determine the ways in which students are taught and assessed. A variety of teaching methods and a range of materials using different media are employed. Students are expected to actively take part in class either individually or through pair and group work activities appropriate to the level (e.g. role-plays, group discussions). They are also expected to study in their own time and become independent learners. Through careful guidance, particularly in the lower stages, students are encouraged to use language resources available online, both tailor-made materials produced at Birkbeck for some courses as well as other freely available materials suitable for different levels through radio/television stations, YouTube, tourist boards, etc.

All courses include formative (i.e., a variety of coursework assignments) and summative (i.e., in-class tests) assessment tasks. Coursework assignments involve, for example, the writing of a variety of texts, starting with short pieces about one's daily routine at beginners' level to the writing of an extended essay on a topic selected by the student at the most advanced level. For

	<p>some courses, some tasks may require interaction with peers through blogs and wikis, for example. Coursework assignments may also integrate reading/listening/viewing with writing skills, requiring students, for example, to make a note of train arrival and departure times, or to reply to an e-mail from a friend at beginners' level, to the writing of a book or a film review at higher levels. Oral performance, on the other hand, is assessed through role-play interactions and short presentations on everyday topics at beginners' level; at higher levels it may involve group discussions and/or presentations through which students display not only their linguistic competence, but also their ability to research a topic and present it in a clear and persuasive way. For discussions and presentations, students are encouraged to work on topics of their interest.</p> <p><u>Study abroad</u> Students taking modules at one of partner institutions will be assessed according to the methods employed at those institutions. Students not based at a university during their time abroad will be expected to submit work to Birkbeck in order to gain credits, including essays and a learning diary. All students may be required to take an oral exam on their return</p>

	<p>For Foundation Year (year zero), see Foundation Year programme specification.</p> <p>All students on all versions of the programme will take in their first-year a compulsory, zero-weighted study skills module, called 'Doing Cultures and Languages'.</p> <p><u>Three-year full-time, four-year part-time, six-year decelerated modes</u></p> <p>All students, whether full-time or part-time, take 120 credits at each of Levels 4, 5 and 6. Full-time students therefore take Level 4 in Year One, Level 5 modules in Year Two and Level 6 modules in Year Three, whereas part-time students take 30 credits of Level 4 in Year Two and 30 credits of Level 6 in Year Three (of four).</p> <p>Normally, 240 credits are made up of Spanish language and Spanish, Portuguese and Latin American Studies 'content' modules and up to 120 credits can be chosen from beyond the SPLAS programme.</p> <p><u>'With International Experience' programmes</u></p> <p>The degree will be made up of 420 credits. 360 credits will be taken at Birkbeck (in accordance with the already existing BA Spanish, Portuguese and Latin American Studies programme). 60 credits will be awarded as APL for the study undertaken during the year abroad (normally as credit only without marks being recorded). The language pathway is determined by the student's level of proficiency in Spanish at entry. Possible entry levels are as follows (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) entry → exit levels for these courses are given in brackets):</p> <p>Spanish 2 (Elementary A2 → Intermediate B1) Spanish 3 (Intermediate B1 → Upper Intermediate B2) Spanish 4 (Upper Intermediate B2 → Advanced C1)</p>

Spanish 5 (Advanced C1 → Proficiency C2)

The language modules in any given pathway are core modules and each is worth 30 credits

Pathway A (available for 6 year programme only)

Students take Spanish 1 (Level 4) in their first year and Spanish 2 (Level 5), Spanish 3 (Level 5), Spanish 4 (Level 5) and Spanish 5 (Level 6) consecutively in subsequent years.

They also take **content** modules, spread over their programme of study as follows: 60 credits at Level 4, 60 credits at Level 5 and 90 credits at Level 6.

Pathway B (not available for 3 year programme)

Students take Spanish 2 (Level 4) in their first year and Spanish 3 (Level 5), Spanish 4 (Level 5) and Spanish 5 (Level 6) consecutively in subsequent years.

They also take **content** modules, spread over their programme of study as follows: 90 credits at Level 4, 60 credits at Level 5 and 90 credits at Level 6.

Pathway C

Students take Spanish 3 (Level 4) in their first year and Spanish 4 (Level 5) and Spanish 5 (Level 6) consecutively in subsequent years.

They also take **content** modules, spread over their programme of study as follows: 90 credits Level 4, 90 credits at Level 5 and 90 credits at Level 6.

Pathway D

Students take Spanish 4 (Level 4) in their first year and Spanish 5 (Level 6) in their second year.

They also take **content** modules, spread over their programme of study as follows: 60 credits at Level 4, 120 credits at Level 5 and 120 credits at Level 6.

Pathway E

Students take Spanish 5 (Level 6) in their second year.

They also take **content** modules, spread over their programme of study as follows: 90 credits at Level 4, 120 credits at Level 5 and 90 credits at Level 6.

For **all Pathways** a minimum of 240 credits of the 360 credits taken must have SPLAS content, including Spanish language, linguistics and culture modules. All students must take 'Studying the Hispanic, Native American and Luso Brazilian Worlds' or 'Introducción al mundo hispánico' (Level 4; 30 credits; compulsory).
