Admissions requirements

2.2 degree in a relevant subject (other arts and humanities) or equivalent (for example, professional experience).

For students with a degree in a not relevant subject, the one-year part-time Graduate Certificate in History of Art and Architecture can be used as a conversion course. Students who successfully complete the Graduate Certificate with Merit will be guaranteed a place on this programme.

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

Course aims

Our MA History of Art with Collections Management will absorb you in the rich and dynamic discipline of the history of art as well as preparing you with the skills and experience you need for the museum workplace with an intensive skills-based Collections Management module. You will gain a solid grasp of the key issues and fundamental skills involved in collections management and an insight into the different working practices of various museums and galleries. During an intensive week studying current issues and practices in curating you will meet curators and collections managers in London's thriving museum, galleries and archives sector, and engage in hands-on activities including documentation, cataloguing and issuing loan requests. This MA aims to:

- expose you to key art historical approaches and allow you to focus in depth on areas and periods of particular interest to you in early, modern and contemporary art, through taught options and independent research.
- Develop your visual acuity and your understanding of art's histories, while stimulating critical debate and stretching your research skills.
- offer you the opportunity to study with internationally recognised experts. Our teaching staff are defining the field, conducting ground-breaking research in periods from medieval to contemporary, focusing on painting, sculpture, print culture, architecture, photography, digital art and museology. You will work closely with our staff while also benefiting from our diverse and vibrant student body of all ages and backgrounds.
- offer you the opportunity to apply for a 10-week supervised work placement in a museum, gallery or archive. Previous work placements have been offered at the Tate, British Museum, Whitechapel Gallery and Horniman Museum. Past students have documented collections that were previously uncatalogued, helped design and run schools programmes, conducted visitor research and assisted curators in producing exhibitions.

Our teaching programme is enriched by museum and site visits, visiting speakers, study trips, research events, and the opportunity to undertake a work placement. Many of our graduates progress to careers in arts-related fields or undertake further postgraduate work.

How you will learn

Your learning and our teaching are organised to help you meet the learning outcomes of the course indicated below. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

The course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

The majority of our sessions are seminar-based, which means you are expected to come having done the reading or other preparation required, which is also essential to engage with and progress through the course. The seminar component of each session enables you to explore ideas and methods, to discuss both the required reading and the results of your personal research and study, and to refine your own skills of argument, communication and presentation. Seminars may include structured or open debate, a close analysis of textual or visual material, small group discussions and task-based work. Classroom based work is supported and enhanced by visits to archives, museums and galleries.

The Collections Management module is taught over one intensive week, morning in class and afternoon on visits, field trips and workshops. You will meet collections managers in London's thriving museum, galleries and archives sector, and engage in hands-on activities including documentation, cataloguing and issuing loan requests. You are expected to have done all the preparatory reading and some of the set work on a Collections Management Project in advance.

As the MA progresses you are expected to become increasingly an independent researcher. This is reflected in the fact that both the research exercise and dissertation are largely self-defined rubrics with guidance from academic members of staff.

Further support and expansion of your areas of interest comes in the form of opportunities to present and discuss with your lecturer and peer-group ideas and plans for essays, the research exercise (or the work placement essay) and the dissertation. Work on the dissertation is further enhanced by work-in-progress seminars in the summer term.

Research seminars, symposia and lectures delivered by relevant guest speakers provide students with an opportunity to engage with current developments and debates in the field.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through essays which will develop in length and expected complexity as you progress through your studies. The Curating module is assessed via an Collection Management Project.

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

You will also be allocated a personal tutor and provided with information about learning support offered within your School and by the College.

You will be also assigned a personal tutor you can contact to discuss your general progress on the course, or to seek help accessing other forms of support.

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. Each new course or module is subject to a course approval process where the proposal is scrutinised by subject specialists, quality professionals and external representatives to ensure that it will offer an excellent student experience and meet the expectation of regulatory and other professional bodies.

We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback.

Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.

The information in this programme specification has been approved by the College's Academic Board and every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information it contains.
