Course aims

The BSc Geography and International Development aims to provide a programme that offers a comprehensive grounding in the main theories, concepts and skills that form the core of the disciplines of Geography and International Development. Specific aims include:

- To provide students with knowledge and understanding of a range of concepts and theories in geography and international development which are relevant to the world today
- To enable students to bridge the gap between their individual experiences and their understanding of theory;
- To provide a range of learning experiences and teaching approaches that enable students to gain confidence, work independently and impart knowledge and understanding of their subject to others;
- To provide access to curricula for students from a wide range of backgrounds, including non-traditional educational backgrounds
- To provide teaching at times to suit the needs of part-time students otherwise engaged during the day. This includes evening classes, weekend field trips and, particularly, web-based access to core teaching materials
- To equip participants with a broad understanding of current issues in geography and international development and the ways these might relate to everyday life;
- To give participants transferable skills in the spheres of both numeracy and literacy, together with a capacity to reason clearly and effectively;
- To develop self-reliance and self-confidence through both individual and group project work.

BA Geography and International Development with Foundation Year:

For the BSc Geography with Foundation Year programme, the purpose of the Foundation Year(s) is to prepare students for successful completion of their undergraduate degree. The Foundation Year (one year FT or two years PT) provides students the opportunity to explore their interests and build on their study skills, and on successful completion of the Foundation Year, students may progress onto year one of the PT or FT programmes. The curriculum for the 'with foundation year' programme after the completion of the foundation year modules is the same as the full-time or part-time BSc programme. Students who successfully complete the versions of the degree programme 'with foundation year' are awarded the same final degree title as students on the full-time or part-time degree routes.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

Teaching on this course is a combination of lectures (pre-recorded) and seminars. Lectures are designed to provide you with an outline or overview of the topic, to engage you with the material and direct you to other resources. They are a springboard for your own learning. Seminars are group sessions where you will be asked to contribute to discussion or group work around the topic, with material set in advance for which you need to prepare.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. We use a variety of assessment methods. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment:

Short written exercises, essays which will develop in length and expected complexity as you progress through your studies, quizzes and multiple-choice questionnaires, reviews, blog posts, case studies, problems to solve.

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

Foundation Year:

By the end of the foundation year, students will be able to:

1. Articulate at a foundational level key concepts in some of the disciplines offered by the School of Social Science, History and Philosophy.
2. Undertake academic reading, writing, research and assessment skills appropriate to the study of those disciplines
3. Understand other key learning skills required for university-level study and know of how to access support at Birkbeck to develop these.

BSc Geography and International Development:

Through studying for the BSc Geography and International Development you will be able to do the following

- 1) Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of contemporary debates in geography, international development, climate change and environment
- 2) Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how intersecting structures of class, race, gender and imperialism shape experiences and relationships globally.
- 3) Apply relevant analytical concepts to a range of issues in geography and international development.

Intellectual:

- 4) critically evaluate different theories and evidence
- 5) express arguments clearly both orally and in writing
- 6) employ your accumulated knowledge and understanding to carry out an independent investigation: define a relevant research topic, undertake an empirical or theoretical investigation, analyse qualitative and quantitative information critically, and present findings clearly and coherently.

Practical:

- 7) locate and assess relevant information
- 8) use library and internet resources

Personal and Social

- 9) relate geography and international development issues and concepts to your everyday experiences
- 10) apply your learning to your professional practices
- 11) plan your work and meet deadlines
- 12) work with others in solving intellectual tasks
- 13) communicate with others more effectively

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. Each new course or module is subject to a course approval process where the

proposal is scrutinised by subject specialists, quality professionals and external representatives to ensure that it will offer an excellent student experience and meet the expectation of regulatory and other professional bodies.

You will be invited to participate in an online survey for each module you take. We take these surveys seriously and they are considered by the course team to develop both modules and the overall courses. Please take the time to complete any surveys you are sent as a student.

We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback.

Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.

The information in this programme specification has been approved by the College's Academic Board and every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information it contains.

Programme specifications are reviewed periodically. If any changes are made to courses, including core and/or compulsory modules, the relevant department is required to provide a revised programme specification. Students will be notified of any changes via Moodle.
