Admissions requirements

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

UCAS tariff:

BSc Health and Social Care and Management: Students who have recently taken A-level (or similar) qualifications will require CCC-ABB at A-Level (or UCAS tariff points 96 - 128). Students who fail to achieve these grades may still be considered for entry if they demonstrate the required level of intellectual commitment and potential. Birkbeck welcomes applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements or consider alternative qualifications based on judgement of academic potential.

BSc Health and Social Care and Management with Foundation Year: This programme is designed for people who can demonstrate the ability and motivation to complete the BSc Health and Social Care but who do not currently meet the entry criteria for direct entrance onto the degree. Applicants will often be invited for interview to discuss their interests and future plans, and to assess their needs and aptitudes. For those students who already have Level 3 qualifications the expectation is that they will have qualifications equivalent to 48 UCAS tariff points. Given that students on the foundation year will be enrolled on degree programmes, applicants will be offered a place only if there is significant evidence to suggest they have the ability to complete the full degree.

The UCAS tariff score is applicable to you if you have recently studied a qualification that has a UCAS tariff equivalence. UCAS provides a <u>tariff calculator</u> for you to work out what your qualification is worth within the UCAS tariff.

Course aims

Are you a current or aspiring health or social care professional looking to take the next steps in your career? Or someone with a deep interest in the growing sectors of health and social care and the role they play in wider society? This programme at Birkbeck has been designed to provide you with a strong academic grounding in the national and international context of health and social care and the inequalities that shape changing needs and the policies that respond to them. Alongside this, the programme will provide you with training in key management and business concepts, grounded in the day to day reality of working in different types of organisation, to support your career in a managerial role, or support you in progressing towards this. Taught by academic experts from the social sciences and the Business School, this degree will enable you to gain work-relevant skills and to develop academic expertise through course content that has been planned to address real-world problems. This degree opens up a range of exciting employment opportunities, helping you to build a career that makes meaningful changes in people's lives.

The aims of the programmes are:

- To develop comprehensive knowledge of health and social care, and the wider social, economic, policy and organisational environment within which they are situated both within the UK and internationally.
- To develop awareness and understanding of the nature of inequalities in health and social care and of measures to combat their effects.

- To develop comprehensive knowledge of workplace organization and issues arising when managing people and resources.
- To develop the ability to work co-operatively and collaboratively as a means of addressing some of the complexities inherent in health and social care services.
- To develop key transferable skills that enhance the employability of health and social care graduates within a flexible labour market.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

Teaching will normally include in-person small-group events such as workshops, seminars and tutorials, supported by rich online materials on our Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) 'Moodle'. The curriculum has been designed to engage with issues of social justice, equality and diversity and their effects on health, wellbeing and care at a range of scales from the local to global. It provides core knowledge for all students about fundamental issues in health and social care, as well as a range of optional modules that allow students to follow themes that are of greatest interest to them and to specialise. At all levels teaching is underpinned by the research of our staff who bring their expert knowledge to the programme. Teaching also integrates key skills for employability and knowledge about working in caring environments to support graduates into work.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment.

Tasks such as working in groups, writing for policy makers and oral presentations as well as more traditional academic essays or reports. Students will have the opportunity to carry out a substantial piece of independent work on a health and social care topic of their choice. At all levels assessment is varied and is designed to allow students to acquire, refine and enhance their skills.

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

At the end of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a critical understanding of the relationship between health, welfare, social need, health and social care, and social organisation in a range of contexts from the local to the global scale.
- 2. Locate health and social care issues and inequalities within historical, contemporary and international social, policy and organisational contexts.
- 3. Critically evaluate the mixed economy of welfare and the interrelationships between health and social care and between the agencies, practitioners and individuals involved in their provision.
- 4. Demonstrate understanding and critical awareness of a range of issues and theories related to the impact of difference and diversity on the incidence and experience of health, illness, disability and ageing in a range of contexts.
- 5. Critically evaluate and synthesise different sources of knowledge and theoretical approaches to social problems and issues demonstrating an in-depth knowledge of one or more areas of health and social care.
- 6. Demonstrate a critical understanding of a range of research methodologies and techniques and the role of social research in understanding health and social care.
- 7. Develop key academic and research skills such as information literacy, competency in using information technology and robust written and verbal presentation skills.
- 8. Design and execute a piece of individual, in-depth research including defining a research problem/question; choosing appropriate methodologies; demonstrating

- awareness of ethical issues and obtaining the appropriate ethical approval; demonstrate the ability to reason about the data and synthesise and present the findings effectively; and discuss the findings in terms of previous research.
- 9. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of relevant workplace organisation and industrial relations issues and approaches to managing them.
- 10. Use professional knowledge and theoretical techniques in the field of cost and management accounting to address practical business problems.

Careers and further study

A degree in Health and Social Care will provide a grounding for a wide variety of careers and employment opportunities in the NHS, the social care sector, voluntary organisations and many private sector organisations. You could work in areas like:

You will also be allocated a personal tutor and provided with information about learning support offered within your School and by the College.

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. Each new course or module is subject to a course approval process where the proposal is scrutinised by subject specialists, quality professionals and external representatives to ensure that it will offer an excellent student experience and meet the expectation of regulatory and other professional bodies.

You will be invited to participate in an online survey for each module you take. We take these surveys seriously and they are considered by the course team to develop both modules and the overall courses. Please take the time to complete any surveys you are sent as a student.

We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback.

Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.

The information in this programme specification has been approved by the College's Academic Board and every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information it contains.

Programme specifications are reviewed periodically. If any changes are made to courses, including core and/or compulsory modules, the relevant department is required to provide a revised programme specification. Students will be notified of any changes via Moodle.
